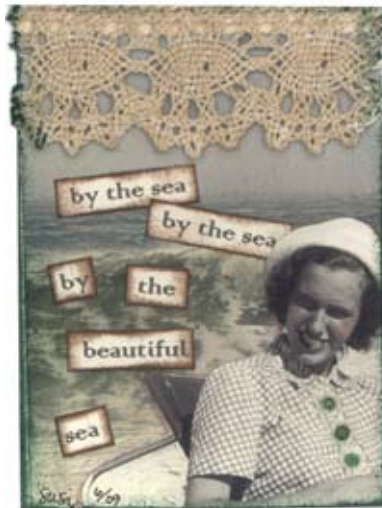
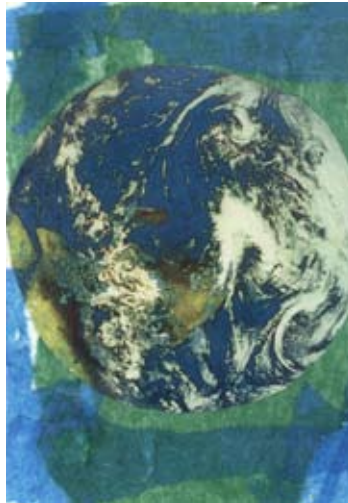
ATC Trades

Exhibitions Corner

The personal story: I joined WCA/NH in 2002, with great encouragement from Joanne Balcom, my aunt and WCA/NH member. I experienced great art and great

people at the gatherings, and eventually agreed to “learn” the Exhibition Coordinator position, starting in fall 2005, and learn I did! After two terms served and 13 exhibitions later, I do have a few “stories.”

The learning story: Being on the board really shows how much it takes to have an organization, large or small. Without membership, friendships, and agreeing to coordinate as one, there would be no association. Putting on and participating in exhibitions is learning so much more than we can do on our own.

The exciting story: While 2005–2007 may have seemed “unexciting” to members looking for it all in one place and chapter, WCA’s growing and changing ideas in those years led to long-term rewards and exhibition opportunities that gave the New Hampshire chapter local and national notice. The idea and desire for an exhibition committee was an obvious need.

The Exhibition Committee story: During 2007–2009 a committee was established and developed. A majority of Committee members are previous board members, each bringing experience and appreciation for the constant need for volunteering from all membership levels. This group of women give repeatedly and *I thank them all personally.*

The volunteer story: Most of our committee members will continue with this important work, but there is always room for new volunteers. As a WCA chapter, we are obliged to provide one juried show and two invitational exhibitions every year.

In recent years, we’ve been able to exceed that goal. But we need member participation for that to continue. There are all kinds of jobs that need doing—large and small. WCA/NH needs our members to plan and execute exhibitions; set up receptions; help with tracking exhibition participants; make contacts with representatives from potential venues and help arrange meetings; create, design, and mail prospectuses; and many other jobs. Every member benefits from exhibitions, so every member can and should be involved.

The WCA/NH exhibition “Resurgence” was at Emporium Framing and Gallery LLC in South Berwick, Maine, April 10–June 10, 2009, with the opening reception on Saturday, May 30. The show was juried by Suzanne Pretty, owner of Emporium and a WCA/NH member.

Sixteen artists working in various mediums brought very different sensibilities to the theme of the earth’s reawakening, ranging from Teresa Taylor’s organic ceramic forms to Donna Catanzaro’s witty and ironic digital collage. Daniela Edstrom also showed a digital collage; also included were an encaustic of Sheryl Lyn Chatterton, oil paintings by Debra Claffey and Aline Lotter, mixed media by Carol Currier, Phyllis Hofman and Wen Redmond, prints by Liz D’Amico and Judith Heller Cassell, photography by Pat Desmarias Edsall, Linda Gilbert Schnieder; Susan Lirakis and Edith Weiler, ceramic by Teresa Taylor, and fiber by Suzanne Pretty.

Donna Catanzaro had a piece included in the juried "Sense of Humor" exhibition

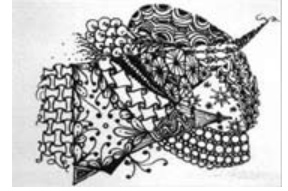
held by WCA Boston at the Bromfield Gallery in downtown Boston.

Zentangle Journal Exchange

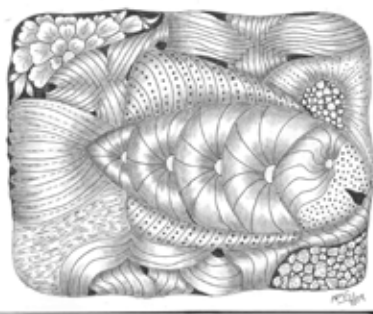
Long after Hues and Views Journal exchange ended, participants spoke of how they missed the monthly delivery of a new journal to work on and how much they had enjoyed the experience. So when Rick and Maria came to the Spring meeting in 2008 and presented their Zentangle workshop, the seeds were planted for a new "round robin." While everyone enjoyed the workshop,

some of us became so hooked that we've been accused of seeing tangles in everything! Of course, we artist would say, "But that's the point!"

Over the year, there were several conversations about doing a journal swap and by April 2009, there was enough interest to form a group. Open to both WCA and non-WCA members, the group includes: Anna Smith, Pat Davis, Carol Currier, Sheree West, Shelley Trube, Sandy Bartholomew, Adele Sanborn, Carole Billeveau, Debbie Skinner Perez, Bette Abdu, Jennifer Swett, and Janet King.

In May, each originating artist created a journal, selected a "string," included any specific instructions, did one or two Zentangled pages and in June, passed it along to the next artist. The rules are pretty simple: you must use the "string" specified in the journal and any directions from the originating artist. A ""string" is the basic line that divides the page into spaces for a variety of "tangles," or patterns. The "string," unless otherwise directed, can be turned and/or resized. Tangles can be from the Zentangle Web site or created by the artist. As part of the journal, artists may also include directions on how to reproduce a personally created tangle.

August first marked the third swap and each journal now contains the work of four artists, including the originating artist. However, the obsessive among us are ahead. (Sheree, October is waiting for you!) Part of the ease of this exchange is that the journals are small and Zentangles can be completed in a relatively short time. And speaking of journals, our thanks to Kay Stein of Wingdoodles for making the moleskin journals available at a discounted price.

And finally, the PICK UP date for unsold panels will be January 8 and 9 from 11 am - 4 pm. at The Paper Tree. If you're in the show, you must pick up your panels on those dates or arrange for someone else to pick them up for you.

As with all our previous exhibits, we look forward to filling the walls with interesting and imaginative art.

Lammas Labyrinth Celebration

Thirteen people gathered on Saturday, August 1, 2009 at the Castle Labyrinth in North Sutton to celebrate Lammas, which honors the fall harvest. Gatherers brought food and a stone to place along the Labyrinth's path. Some stones were decorated or chosen as a symbol of someone in need of healing. Anne Boedecker led the ritual asking for a blessing of Earth's heal-



ing energy by calling on the five directions. These included the traditional North, South, East and West with the added direction for Earth. Five participants stood at the location of each direction and placed gifts at each of the five directions during the opening ritual. Visitors lit candles for someone in need of healing, some left written notes that were buried or placed under a stone. After being smudged with sage participants walked the Labyrinth to the rhythmic beating of a drum. This was followed by a sharing of each person's experience while holding a traditional Native American talking stick. During the closing ceremony, the circle was opened as everyone faced each of the four directions and Anne read prayers of thanks.
